

THE PUBLIC THEATER ANNOUNCES SEAGULL: TRUE STORY ADDED TO SPRING 2026 SEASON

November 12, 2025 – The Public Theater (Oskar Eustis, Artistic Director and Patrick Willingham, Executive Director) announced today that **MART Foundation**'s production of **SEAGULL: TRUE STORY**, written by **Eli Rarey** and created and directed by **Alexander Molochnikov**, has been added to The Public's 2025-2026 season. Following sold-out runs at La MaMa and London's Marylebone Theatre, the production begins performances in The Public's LuEsther Hall with a Joseph Papp Free Performance on Sunday, March 22 and officially opens on Monday, March 30. **SEAGULL: TRUE STORY** will run through Sunday, April 26.

Written by **Eli Rarey** and created and directed by **Alexander Molochnikov**, an internationally acclaimed director from the Moscow Art Theatre, **SEAGULL: TRUE STORY** fuses autobiographical drama and biting political satire with classic Chekhovian themes. This politically charged retelling of Molochnikov's attempt to stage Chekhov's *The Seagull* unfolds as a whirlwind of comedic mayhem, artistic rebellion, and deeply personal reflection on displacement, censorship, and the pursuit of creative freedom. Featuring an extraordinary ensemble of international artists, **SEAGULL: TRUE STORY** offers a provocative and poignant exploration of artistic survival, resistance to censorship, and the transformative power of live theater.

MART Foundation Executive Producer **Sofia Kapkov** shares, "**SEAGULL: TRUE STORY** is a play about empathy, betrayal, and the choices that shape our lives long after we make them. There is no better home for it than The Public Theater—a place where human truth, community, and bold voices come together on stage."

The Public's 2025-26 Season is underway with Emmy Award winner John Leguizamo's return to The Public with the family drama THE OTHER AMERICANS, a gripping tale about the American dream directed by Tony Award winner Ruben Santiago-Hudson. The Public's collaboration with Ma-Yi Theater Company continues with the first of two plays in this season's residency, DID YOU EAT? (밥 먹었니?), featuring playwright and performer Zoë Kim's autobiographical journey through love's many forms, directed by Chris Yejin. THE SEAT OF OUR PANTS, Obie Award winner Ethan Lipton's irreverently funny musical adaptation of Thornton Wilder's Pulitzer Prize-winning play The Skin of Our Teeth, makes its world premiere in a production directed by Tony nominee Leigh Silverman. The fall season closes out with INITIATIVE, a world premiere play by Emerging Writers Group alumnus Else Went and directed by Emma Rosa Went following the intertwined lives of seven teens from 2000-2004 in "Coastal Podunk, California."

BIOS

ELI RAREY (*Writer*) is an independent filmmaker, playwright, performance artist, and poet. His feature film *The Famous Joe Project* premiered at Outfest in 2012. Rarey was a founding member of SCIENCE PROJECT performance collective and has written, directed, and performed on stage with Planet Ant Theater in Detroit. He holds a bachelor's degree from Columbia University in Theater Arts and an MFA degree from USC School of Cinematic Arts, where he later taught in the Interactive Media Division. He is overwhelmed with gratitude to be part of the creative team bringing this unique play to life.

ALEXANDER MOLOCHNIKOV (*Creator and Director*) is a theater director, writer, and filmmaker. He worked for over 10 years in Moscow where he directed five major productions in drama, a ballet, an opera, two feature films, and a TV show. In 2022, he spoke out against the Russian military invasion of Ukraine and then moved to New York. He is now unable to return home to Russia. Since 2014, his first play, 19.14 *Cabaret*, an antiwar manifest about World War I, has been running in repertoire for over 11 years at the Moscow Art Theatre of Chekov. However, the theater has removed his name from all materials. The billing now says "Directed by Director." Molochnikov's production of the opera *The Telephone. Medium* by Gian Carlo Menotti premiered at the Bolshoi Theatre, along with his ballet *The Seagull*, which was honored with the "Golden Mask" (the Russian equivalent of the Tony Awards) for best ballet of the year. His feature film, *Tell Her*, about moving to the U.S. as a child, premiered in 2020 at the 47th SIFF. He has created and directed over 10 shows and films in Moscow including the most viewed six-episode TV series "Monastery" in 2022. He premiered a *Crime and Punishment* show at the Tel Aviv Gesher Theatre in December 2024. He is working now on a feature film related to the novel. His short film *Extremist* is long-listed for the 2025 BAFTA awards and premiered in Telluride; he is now turning it into a feature.

MART FOUNDATION, run by Sofia Kapkov, is an American nonprofit organization that produces and supports contemporary performing arts programs globally. With a special focus on co-productions, MART co-produced the New York premiere of *Our Class* at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, which was named one of the best productions of 2024 by the *Wall Street Journal* and more recently, won four Lucille Lortel Awards. Most recently, MART co-produced Sharon Eyal's *Into The Hairy* for Nederlands Dans Theater and supported *What We Talk About When We Talk About Anne Frank* at the Marylebone Theater. MART has collaborated with renowned artists, institutions, and festivals, including Akram Khan, Sharon Eyal, Gibney Company, Carnegie Hall, Sadler's Wells, the Barbican Centre, Holland Dance Festival, and Festival d'Avignon, among others. By curating an inventive and varied arts program, MART strives to showcase the very best of contemporary theater, music, and dance. martfdn.org

THE PUBLIC continues the work of its visionary founder Joe Papp as a civic institution engaging, both onstage and off, with some of the most important ideas and social issues of today. Conceived over 60 years ago as one of the nation's first nonprofit theaters, The Public has long operated on the principles that theater is an essential cultural force and that art and culture belong to everyone. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Oskar Eustis and Executive Director Patrick Willingham, The Public's wide breadth of programming includes an annual season of new work at its landmark home at Astor Place, Free Shakespeare in the Park at The Delacorte Theater in Central Park, Mobile Unit touring throughout New York City's five boroughs, Public Works, and Joe's Pub. Since premiering *HAIR* in 1967, The Public continues to create the canon of American Theater and is currently represented on Broadway by the Tony Award-winning musicals *Hamilton* by Lin-Manuel Miranda and *Hell's Kitchen* by Alicia Keys and Kristoffer Diaz. Their programs and productions can also be seen regionally across the country and around the world. The Public has received 64 Tony Awards, 195 Obie Awards, 62 Drama Desk Awards, 64 Lortel Awards, 36 Outer Critic Circle Awards, 13 New York Drama Critics' Circle Awards, 70 AUDELCO Awards, 6 Antonyo Awards, and 6 Pulitzer Prizes. publictheater.org
